WHO ARE THE CHEATERS?





Authentic Angela

* Who is taking the exam? Is Angela really Alex?



Technological Tim

* Uses his mobile device or phone to text others for answers



Quick Search Sam

* Swiftly searches by pasting question parts in a search tool



WHO ARE THE CHEATERS?





Open Book Betty

- * hasn't read the textbook all semester
- * skims fast to find the answers



Collaborative Colleen

* takes the exam simultaneously with others so they can share answers



Tattoo Taylor

* has full arm tattoo with room for answers



"STUDENT STRATEGIES AND PERCEPTIONS REGARDING CHEATING IN ONLINE COURSES"



- Two mid-western universities
- 378 student surveys returned
- Students taking online courses
- x Graduate Level 72%
- Undergraduate Level 28%
- 42% said they cheated in online quizzes




COLLABORATION



- Most common form of cheating
 - + on quizzes, tests, proctored exams
- Synchronous test-taking
 - + (share & compare)
 - + Phone
 - + Face to face
 - + Skyping (or other online tool)
- Asynchronous sharing later on not as much





NOTE TAKING AND SEARCHING



- Most often used for quizzes, high stakes tests, and proctored tests
 - + Closed book and closed note assessments
 - + Own notes, digital, or paper
- Search via phone, search engines, PDF search



WHY DO STUDENTS CHEAT




- Justifications / Explanations:
 - + Prior Experience
 - × Previous online course experiences practice & study tools
 - + Poor Performance / Need for grade to pass
 - Fear of high stakes
 - + Consider multiple choice low risk of being caught

BENEFITS OF ONLINE EXAMS



* Students:

- + Flexibility
- + Immediate feedback

Faculty:

- Not giving up class time for exams
- Potential for enhanced student learning
- More testing options
- + Cost savings

- Authentication of test takers
- Cheating
- Password issues
- Proctored exams
 - + Finding proctors
 - Quality of proctors
 - + How many proctors?








- ProctorHub is a tool that can be added to a Webcourses@UCF course to assist with assessment authentication and to help curb cheating.
- ProctorHub uses a test taker's webcam and web browser features to record test-taking sessions.
- Instructors are able to review individual testing sessions should they suspect issues of academic integrity.





VIEWING PROCTORHUB CAPTURES

- Pictures are captured every few seconds
- Original retrieval you get a series of pictures
- Picture converted to video once a week
- Pictures kept for a period of time





VIEWING STRATEGIES



- View all (small classes)
- Random sample
- Any suspicious answers
- Students who grades suddenly improve





STUDENT FEEDBACK

- × Pilot class: 76 students
- Survey responses: 51
- Took advantage of Practice Quiz: 84%
- Instructions were clear: 98%
- Concerns about using ProctorHub
 - + None: 27%
 - + How interruptions were perceived
 - + Dislike for being recorded



BENEFITS OF PROCTORHUB



"If people had a sense that they were being monitored or that there is a higher chance of getting caught, then they were less likely to do it."



STRATEGIES FOR MINIMIZING CHEATING




- Alternative High Stake Assessment methods
 - + Use more Authentic Assessment strategies
 - × Project-based
 - × Performance-based
- Formal contract state it, sign it
- Clear, explicit definition of what is cheating
 - + Syllabus
 - + Within test or prior to taking



STRATEGIES FOR MINIMIZING CHEATING



- Only reveal questions & answers after
 the test deadline has passed
- Release grades after test deadline
- Spot check test times for any completed below 'realistic' time frame






QUIZ CREATION STRATEGIES



- Use Question Groups to randomize questions
- Randomize answers in multiple choice questions
- Use robust database of questions
- Use authentic learning, i.e. case studies, essays
- × Settings:
 - + Limit availability exam can only be taken Wed.-Fri.
 - + Limit duration how long the exam is open
