What Constitutes an Online Teaching Persona?



- The parts of yourself that you want to share with students
 - Purposeful
 - Curated
- Selection/manipulation of images, videos, opinions, likes/dislikes (your digital self)
- Reflection of your critical beliefs (authentic self)

Why Do I Need an Online Persona: The Human Element


- Your online persona is important! It conveys:
 - Intimacy
 - Energy/humor
 - Building sense of community
- LMSs don't automatically convey your personality and all that goes with it (e.g., humor, caring, engagement).
 - Capacity to convey personality in text is limited
 - LMSs can support the creation of an online teaching persona as they offer more robust features such as LTIs and video function.

(Coppola, Hiltz, & Rotter, 2002)



Your Online Persona Can Be an Important Driver of Student Success

- Online teaching persona is ultimately a strong measure of instructor involvement and instructor presence.
- Both presence and engagement drive student suc

How Do I Create Videos that Convey My Personality?

Make a Plan

- Create a script
 - Maximize limited time on computer screen
- Grab viewers' attention
 - Pay attention to word choice

Be Authentic

- Consider your multiple roles (instructor, professional in the field)
- Emphasize that I am approachable
- Use humor




Shaping the Message: Nonverbal Cues

Design considerations:

- What am I wearing?
- How do I look (grooming)?
- What message does my video background convey?
- What is my musical choice?
- What other artistic choices do I want to make?

Video 3: Legal Research



Online Persona: Gain Credibility

Benefits of developing an online persona:

- Demonstrate that I practice what I preach
- Share "war stories" from the field that are engaging
- Shows that course content applies to the "real world."

- Allow for multiple retakes.
- Be prepared to listen to ideas regarding special effects.
- Be open to your video specialist's ideas!
